



Covid-19. Coronavirus Pandemic — Update

The Choir has been in hibernation since the end of March, together with most of the choral world, while we await scientific clarification and government advice on the COVID19 effects of singing. We have also cancelled all our concerts for the rest of 2020. Each month we have hoped to be able to get back to some form of rehearsals subject to social distancing rules while waiting for more information from the Welsh Government.

Rather than being in limbo the Choir Committee have now taken the decision that we will not attempt to restart full rehearsals this year but will instead aim to restart full rehearsals again on the 14 January 2021. This will of course still be subject to social distancing and we understand that there will be other issues to for choristers to consider including underlying health issues, the Flu Season, winter nights and possible snowfall. Some members may wish to stay away until such time as we have a vaccination programme.

If restrictions are lifted sufficiently it may be possible to hold some short sectional rehearsals later this year.

Excellent work has been undertaken by David Poole in measuring up the existing rehearsal spaces at Ebenezer and working out how many singers can fit in any rehearsal space within the distancing rules. We are also drawing up risk assessment guidelines so that, when we do restart, we have a safe environment to sing in.

Rules have also changed to allow up to 30 people to rehearse outdoors providing social distance rules are adhered to.

The Welsh Association of Male choir have provided an updated information about Choral Singing which you will find on the next page.

I know that many people are anxious about the current rules relating to choirs coming together again and i hope the following helps.

You will be aware that the regulations relating to most aspects of the current Coronavirus position are determined by the four home countries separately; some however are established by the UK Government. The current position in Wales as far as choirs are concerned is that groups of no more than 30 people are allowed to sing together outdoors as long as suitable mitigation and precautions are in place. In England the regulations were amended on 13th August and choirs in England have much more leeway for practice and performance including indoors. The new guidance for England can be found here:

Steps that will usually be needed:

• Providing space for performers and other attendees to be socially distanced from each other and from any audience, production team members or other individuals, wherever possible during training, rehearsal, pre-production, performance and any other form of performing arts activity.

• Working outdoors where possible. Where this is not possible, ensuring all rehearsal, training and performance areas, with particular regard to indoor and covered areas, have maximum ventilation whenever staff or audiences are present.

• Organising and designing repertoire, rehearsals, training and performance to avoid situations where performers cannot socially distance, wherever feasible.

• Reducing as far as possible any time that individuals are not able to maintain social distancing.

• Reducing group and cast sizes where possible to maintain social distancing. Conducting rehearsals and training in smaller fixed teams wherever possible.

• Adapting live performing arts to ensure they are safe. If that is not possible, consider the use of technology solutions to reduce interactions and ensure social distancing (for example for castings, rehearsals, training and performance).

• Removing non-essential common areas such as waiting rooms.

• Using floor tape or paint to mark areas to help people maintain social distance, where possible.

• Positioning side-to-side or back-to-back and avoiding working face-to-face wherever possible.

• Screening of anyone prior to entry into venues, which may include, but not be limited to, a COVID-19 symptom questionnaire.

• Ensuring there is a clear policy in place for managing a COVID-19 positive individual, and abiding by government and PHE guidelines and reporting requirements. **Meet the Choir**

DRAFT REPORT AND PROPOSAL FOR THE INTRODUCTION OF POSSIBLE CHOIR BUDDY SYSTEM

1.0 Aims and Benefits of Buddy Systems

1.1 Throughout the lockdown period the Committee has tried to keep up to date with health and welfare issues and other needs within the membership. In employment and education, Buddy Systems are cooperative arrangements whereby individuals are paired or teamed to assume responsibility for one another's welfare or safety. Such arrangements can also offer opportunities to develop more inclusive management systems for clubs and societies such as the Choir in it's day to day running. They can reduce the pressure on individual officers to resolve everyday issues. Where matters arise that cannot be resolved through initial 'buddy link' they can be circulated around the system and/or referred directly to the officers of the Committee in the traditional way.

2.0 Functions of a Choir Buddy System

2.1 Some of the initial functions of a system would be to make sure that buddies are made aware of any health or transport difficulties that individuals are experiencing. Thus pick ups, home visits etc. can be arranged and information passed on to the Committee where necessary. Another important function would be to help and encourage new members through mentoring, first by a temporary link to an established buddy group, who would make sure that the prospective member is made to feel welcome. The Buddy Coordinator would select the temporary attachment based upon a section or locality. The new member would join the full system at a later stage. It is hoped that the new Choir Lottery will be of great benefit to the financial well being of the Choir. Along with the benefits there will be a commitment for ticket numbers to be registered before each draw. The buddy system can be useful in that those not able to attend rehearsal on any particular occasion can provide verifiable proof of ticket buyers and numbers by email to a buddy (crucially before the draw is made), or deliver the tickets to a buddy who will be attending practice. The scope and functions of a buddy system would hopefully evolve and extend over time.

3.0 Possible System Structure

3.1 For practical reasons it is perhaps beneficial for links to be arranged where possible on the basis of shared locality or from existing close friendship groups, in order to make any practical assistance easier. It is accepted that this may not always be possible however, and it is not a fundamental requirement for the system to work.


3.2 The initial concept is that each Chorister has a direct, functional relationship with two other members in an open loop. A working example using eight initial participants is shown overleaf. Perhaps the easiest way to visualise it is a group of people joining hands around a table to form a complete a circle.

3.3 When a new prospective member arrives at practice his contact details will be given initially to a two or three man group who will act as mentors until he formally accepts membership. On becoming a full member the current links will need to be broken to allow him to join into an extended system. The Buddy Coordinator can select an appropriate position, again based upon location or friendships. If a member leaves the Choir the two members with a shared link to the departing member simply join to complete the circle again.

4.0 Development and Implementation


4.1 The first stage would be to assemble and maintain a complete list of home, telephone and home addresses for the Choir. Once established, each member would need then to make sure that details of his buddies were kept up to date. A Coordinator would need to set up the initial link chain, refresh and maintain the links as the Choir changes over time. Buddies should try to communicate informally and regularly.

4.2 It is proposed that the issue be placed upon the Agenda for the next meeting of the Choir Committee and discussed with a view to securing support from the full membership.
